Our Annual Report 2021-22

We are pleased to have published our Annual Report, looking back at our achievements, new



projects, innovations and the real-world improvements to patient outcomes we've delivered.

Our wide-ranging work continues to address the challenges that have arisen from the pandemic, as well as our long-term priorities as an organisation. Our projects have included:

- working with partners to understand how Covid-19 has impacted mental health service users and what lessons can be learned for service models in the future;
- a rapid evaluation into the virtual ward at Croydon Health Services NHS Trust to understand the impact it had on patients and how patient care initiatives can be improved;
- supporting African and Caribbean communities at higher risk of developing type 2 diabetes, through Healthy Eating and Active Lifestyles for Diabetes (HEAL-D), a culturally tailored diabetes management programme;
- working with the wider AHSN Network to support mental health teams in delivering First Episode Rapid Early Intervention for Eating Disorders (FREED) for 16 to 25 year olds.

We've also helped people with knee, hip and back pain, worked on improving treatment for long-term dermatology conditions, and supported the next generation of NHS innovators.
